### The L.A. Sheriff's Department's Entanglement with ICE

On September 22, 2015, Los Angeles County Sheriff Jim McDonnell revealed his plan to continue the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's (LASD's) [collaboration with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement](#) (ICE). Although the L.A. County Board of Supervisors voted in May 2015 to end the 287g program—a similar and widely discredited federal program that deputized sheriff's deputies to enforce civil immigration law—and close ICE's permanent office in the jails, LASD's latest policy [will do much of the same](#).

This infographic outlines how LASD will continue to entangle itself with the deportation process, the policy's connection to the [California TRUST Act](#), and likely outcomes for affected people.

We must remain vigilant to ensure that LASD follows its own policy and does not violate Los Angeles County residents' human and civil rights.

# Los Angeles Sheriff's Department's Proposed Implementation of PEP (Priority Enforcement Program)



Person is arrested



Taken to jail and booked



Fingerprints shared with ICE



ICE issues a request for LASD to notify them of the person's release date and other info



LASD complies with ICE request for notification up to 7 days before the person's release date\*

ICE issues a request for LASD to detain person for transfer into ICE custody



ICE requests interview†



LASD notifies the person of the detainer request



LASD screens person against CA TRUST Act (AB 4)



If person is NOT protected by TRUST Act, LASD gives ICE up to 7 days to question the person before he or she is released



ICE questions the person



LASD transfers person to ICE



If person is protected by the TRUST Act, ICE may not interview the person and LASD may not transfer to ICE



Person is released\*

\*LASD also grants ICE "access to ALL inmates who are being released" at the Inmate Reception Center (IRC). ICE agents will also have full access to LASD databases. With this information ICE may await an individual in or outside the jail on the day of his or her release.

† In the absence of a formal detainer request, ICE may request an interview with an individual who it decides (1) has a "high likelihood" of being in the U.S. without permission; (2) falls within enforcement priorities; and (3) is not protected by the CA TRUST Act (AB 4).
