

## **Afghan New Arrivals and Access to Public Benefits**

This document provides a summary of newly arrived Afghans' eligibility for federal public benefits. It specifically covers eligibility based on the immigration statuses named by the <u>U.S. Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)</u> as the most common among newly arrived Afghans (additional requirements such as income thresholds may apply).

The information is provided to support local advocates and service providers who want to learn more about the benefits that Afghan new arrivals may be able to receive. The information is focused on federal public benefits programs, but additional options may exist in your state.

Afghan Special Immigrant Visa holders (SIV); and	Afghans entering with SIV status or SQ/SI Parole are eligible for the major federal means-tested public benefit programs without a five-year waiting period, as well as other federal public benefits.

## **ASSISTING AFGHAN NEW ARRIVALS WITH ACCESS TO SERVICES**

On September 30, 2021, Congress <u>passed a law</u> that allows Afghans granted parole between <u>July 31, 2021, and September 30, 2022,</u> to be eligible for federal benefits to the same extent as refugees. On September 30, 2022, Congress <u>extended</u> the provision to cover Afghans granted parole up to <u>December 16, 2022</u>. (Their spouses, children and parents/guardians of unaccompanied minors granted parole after that date are also eligible for these benefits).

On August 3, 2021, ORR issued a <u>policy letter</u> updating the public on the documentation requirements for Afghans to be eligible for services offered by the Refugee Resettlement Program (RRP). Individuals must have documents showing that they have been issued one of the specific statuses or classifications served by ORR to receive ORR benefits or services.
